# Financial Literacy



### Powering Amazing Experiences

The Girl Scout Cookie Program is the largest girl-run financial literacy program in the world. Through the program, Girl Scouts learn and practice five essential financial literacy skills:

- Money Management
- Goal Setting
- Decision Making
- Business Ethics
- · People Skills

2,118 Girl Scouts participated in the Girl Scout Cookie Program in 2019, selling delicious cookies customers ask for by name. Many Girl Scouts also donated boxes of cookies through the Gift of Caring program to several local nonprofit organizations, such as Blue Star Mothers of Sierra Nevada, Children's Cabinet of Nevada, Ronald McDonald House, and the Food Bank of Northern Nevada. Through immersive workshops such as Cookie Rookie and Cookie CEO, Girl Scouts across our council were well-prepared for a successful cookie season.

### Adventure

Girl Scouts are known to pack their bags full of life-changing experiences and make friends from all over the country! **Girl Scouts** and adult volunteers from Service Unit 615 traveled to Costa Rica in July 2019 on a tropical adventure.

During the trip, girls experienced different ecosystems, the culture, the history, the food, and the people of Costa Rica. They hiked through and zip-lined over the rainforest, kayaked in view of an active volcano, walked in the cloud forest and enjoyed many other amazing adventures!

The girls were able to meet with Scouts from Costa Rica and have a meeting on the beach at which they sang Scout songs and played games.

Terri Kolstrup, who traveled with the girls, said she "was amazed and proud to watch [her] girls be independent, be fun and funny and have courage and stamina with all that they did."

### Reach for the Stars

Girl Scouts of the Sierra Nevada (GSSN) introduces Girl Scouts of every age to science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) to help them see how they can improve the world. Our goal through our "fun with purpose" K-12 STEM curriculum is for every girl to explore different aspects of STEM and to inspire girls to embrace and celebrate scientific discovery in their lives.

In 2019, **42 new badges and Journeys were released**, allowing Girl Scouts to explore cybersecurity, space science, and coding.

**GSSN continued to deliver the NASA: "Reaching for the Stars" grant program** by holding two Star Parties at which over 350 Girl Scouts explored our solar system and met our galactic neighbors, investigated the moon and its phases, discovered constellations and the stories behind them, saw a solar flare through a telescope, and visited with astronomers from the Night Sky Network.

### Camp Wasiu II

GSSN's summer resident camp and outdoor programs provide girls with time in nature away from a digital environment. Camp Wasiu II, our beautiful overnight camp near Sierra City, California, provides girls in grades 1 to 12 with a deep appreciation for environmental stewardship. Our camp attendance this summer grew by 5 percent for the second year in a row, providing more leadership opportunities and outdoor experiences for girls from northern Nevada and northeastern California.

Popular camp activities this summer included archery, standup paddle boarding, canoeing, swimming, shelter building, backpacking, playing giant chess and Jenga, and riding bikes. **Thirteen Girl Scouts backpacked through Lassen Volcanic National Park** where they learned about hydrothermal activity and climbed to the top of one of the largest plug dome volcanoes in the world.
