More Than Just Cookies

The Girl Scout Cookie Program is the world's largest girl-run entrepreneurship program. The 2022 Cookie Kickoff for the Girl Scouts of the Sierra Nevada (GSSN) was sponsored by US Bank and was held in-person for the first time since the pandemic started.

Throughout the program, each Girl Scout learned the five essential financial literacy skills:

- ·Money Management
- Goal Setting
- Decision Making
- •Business Ethics
- •People Skills

In addition to these skills, many Girl Scouts were philanthropic and donated to several local nonprofits.

Many Girl Scouts also donated boxes of cookies through the Gift of Sharing program. They donated to several nonprofit organizations including but not limited to Food Bank of Northern Nevada, Project 150, and Eddy House. In total 4,836 boxes were sold/donated to nonprofit organizations.



Fall Product Program

Girl Scouts are famous for their cookie sales, but not everyone knows we sell nuts, chocolates, and magazines in the fall. This is predominantly a sale to friends and families to kickoff the year and the Nut & Candy delivery comes at the perfect time for holiday giving.

Fall Product is a great way for troops to earn startup money without having to wait for cookie season. The troops can use the funds they earn how they wish. Many save the funds to use after cookie season for trips, programs throughout the year or to enjoy a day at camp, either together as a troop or individually.

This year to kick off Fall Product the Girl Scouts attended a Hawaiian Luau themed roller skating event. The event was open to Girl Scouts and their families.

This year 322 girls participated in the Fall Product sale and 13,538 units were sold.

Fun with Purpose

Girl Scouts of the Sierra Nevada engages Girl Scouts of every age with programs in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). Our goals through our STEM curriculum are for every Girl Scout to explore different aspects of STEM and to inspire Girl Scouts to embrace and celebrate scientific discovery in their lives.

Girl Scouts started off the year with a STEMfest which was open to Girl Scouts and their families. It showcased a variety of STEM-related activities such as owl pellet dissections, catapults, solar oven s'mores, robotics, math in nature, and many more. UNR and local STEM companies helped in conducting the activities. As Girl Scouts engaged in these programs, there was opportunity to learn about careers in STEM. Programs like these are designed to highlight opportunities in the field of STEM and show Girl Scouts that they are not limited in career options.

In September, Girl Scouts traveled to San Francisco to the San Francisco Exploratorium. This field trip was sponsored by Union Pacific.

The Exploratorium had six exhibits with 20+ activities in each exhibit. The 6 exhibits that the Girl Scouts were able to experience and enjoy were Aurora Lights, Balancing Balls, Bacteropolis, Circuit Workbench, and Colored Shadows. STEM field trips are a great way to further expand Girl Scouts' knowledge and have fun with science.

Life Skills

The Girl Scout programming has five proven, life-long benefits, that enrich participants' lives and help them to grow into well rounded, active community members. The five proven outcomes are:

- Sense of self
- Challenge Seeking
- Positive Values
- Healthy Relationships
- · Community Problem Solving

The Life Skill badges that adorn the Girl Scouts' vests mark achievements such as civic engagement, financial literacy, and practical skills. The badges are grouped together under big picture experiences called Journeys. Three journeys follow the Girl Scouts as they grow: It's Your World- Change It!, It's your Planet- Love it!, and It's Your Story-Tell it!

The life skills learned through Girl Scouts' quality programming help to lay the groundwork for participants' life development which ultimately helps them grow into the change-makers of the world. For example, one of our Daisy members joined older Girl Scouts at the Reno Media Group to record radio commercials for cookie season. Though shy at first, she found her voice and stepped up to the microphone.

Making a Difference

A major focus of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Program is serving historically underserved communities. Families living in low socioeconomic segments struggle with poverty-related barriers that can prevent girls from participating in Girl Scouts. In these communities, where appointing volunteers can be difficult, Girl Scouts of the Sierra Nevada provides leadership opportunities for Girl Scouts by utilizing trained program staff (troop leaders). Council program leaders foster healthy long-term relationships with the Girl Scouts whom they see at regular troop meetings. The DEI Program partners with several organizations in the communities throughout our council to better identify low-income areas.

Last summer, GSSN's Outdoor Experience Manager took a group of local Girl Scouts on a day hike in the northern Nevada wilderness. The hikers—all first-generation Girl Scouts participating in the Low-Income Families & Neighborhoods Program—were nervous about a long hike, worried they might not be able to finish. And yet, at the end of the day, every single Girl Scout completed it.

As they sat proudly under the trees at the top of the mountain they climbed, the Girl Scouts reflected on how it felt to conquer a difficult challenge. They talked about a world that existed only in their imaginations—a perfect "Girltopia" where every Girl Scout knew her own worth and felt confident in her ability to succeed. Every single Girl Scout had tears in her eyes as each spoke of how connected she felt with the others and how proud she was for overcoming her fear of a difficult hike.

Special moments like these are what make Girl Scouting the best leadership experience in the world, offering Girl Scouts opportunities to develop valuable life skills. It is our goal to empower EVERY girl to develop her full potential and make the world a better place.

Gold Award Girl Scouts

"A Moment of Science" Awarded the Crutchfield-Healy Memorial Scholarship

Denali Cooke's "A Moment of Science" Gold Award project inspiration came when she realized women and minorities all over the world are underrepresented in STEM careers, primarily because of their lack of exposure, opportunities, and role models. Even now, in the wenty-first century, when people envision a scientist, women and minorities are not the first images that come to mind, and children are still exposed to that stereotype. For her project, Denali focused on giving young women and minorities at the Boys and Girls Club of North Lake Tahoe the opportunity to gain exposure to STEM and science through fun activities and experiments.

Her hope was to inspire an interest in these fields in a new generation, and Denali feels as though she successfully did so. Everyone Denali worked with loved the activities, and she truly believes that she successfully inspired the next generation of scientists.



"Connecting the Dots"

Julianna Martin's "Connecting the Dots" Gold Award project was born in the midst of the collective isolation that resulted from COVID-19 and after a classmate took their own life. Julianna used portrait photography to visualize the connections that form her school community and to show students why their lives matter. She photographed unique portraits of each freshman student holding an object that represented their individual story, collected nearly two hundred of their personal written reflections, and compiled the portraits and statements in a large-scale public display at

Truckee High School, in Truckee, CA. Julianna revealed the essential role that students play in each other's lives by showcasing their interconnectedness, and allowing students to see that they belonged among the faces on the wall simply because they bring something unique to their school. In addition to the portrait display, Julianna also filmed an educational video series with her school counseling team on mental health topics such as how to maintain your personal mental health and what to do if a friend is struggling with their mental health.

Gold Award Girl Scouts

"Helping the Wild"

Siena Lopez's "Helping the Wild" Gold Award project is a series of three educational art tutorials that teach how to draw three different birds from around the world that are threatened by wildfires. Students learn to create art using the Spix's Macaw from the Amazon. the California Condor from the United States, and the Swift Parrot from Australia while learning environmental facts about each of these threatened bird species as well as facts about other wildlife affected by wildfires. Siena's "Helping the Wild" videos are now used by the Glenshire Elementary School in Truckee, CA, to bring art and environmental awareness into the students' school curricula.

In addition to teaching art techniques, the videos teach students empathy for their environment and good environmental sustainability habits.

Siena started Girl Scouts in first grade as a Daisy. Being a Girl Scout has fundamentally shaped who she is as a person.

She's had many incredible experiences with her troop leader and troop members, such as attending campages with her

"Walk the Solar System"

Wendy Thompson's "Walk the Solar System" Gold Award project provides free resources to teachers, parents, and troop leaders to enrich their science. curricula and add hands-on learning activities to their classrooms. Wendy created a website with customizable lesson plans with worksheets and addons such as coloring pages. These activities culminate in students creating a to-scale, walkable model of our Solar System. Wendy also created physical sets of Solar System object posters with original paintings and important facts that she gave to

staff at The Discovery museum in Reno and the Girl Scout Service Center for long-term use.

Wendy started Girl Scouts 13 years ago as a Brownie and has participated every year since. For many years, she was part of a variety of troops in Girl Scout councils both in Florida and Nevada, and in eighth grade she became a Juliette Girl Scout. She has attended Girl Scout camps, joined weekend activities, sold cookies and fall products, and received her Bronze, Silver, and finally Gold Awards.
